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### President's Welcome

This is the first time our association has met in Montreal and the first time we have encouraged papers in another language. Thus we exemplify the theme of the conference, "Changing Social Connections in Time and Space." We are all aware of how time has conquered space in our everyday lives due to social media and the internet, but "social connectedness" has been much less explored in the past. We know about some connections – trade, epidemics, transportation, to name only a few - but the different realms have not been considered together to ask more general questions about the social fabric. Are claims for how connected we are today exaggerated? We will not know unless we use the new measures and tools to elucidate materials from the past. I am grateful to the Program Co Chairs, Barry Eidlin, Dan Lefreniere and Mary Louise Nagata and the Network Chairs for putting together a very exciting program with many sessions that do just that.

This year we have two special events that can help us understand Québécois society and culture. I am grateful to Robert Sweeney for offering two walking tours and to Barry Eidlin for organizing a special showing of the 1991 film *Comfort and Indifference* by Academy Award-winning French-Canadian director Denys Arcand. This film tells the story of the 1980 referendum for Quebec Independence, which only lost by the narrowest of margins. It will be shown on Friday after the last paper session, at 7 PM, and afterwards there will be a question and answer period moderated by University of Michigan sociologist Geneviève Zubrzycki, an expert on Québécois society and culture. We are launching a new fundraising campaign *Preserving the Past, Advancing the Future*. We hope you will join us. Our efforts have already provided more and larger travel awards to graduate students than before – one per network ( listed on page X). More than one third of our attendees are graduate students. Our non hierarchical structure allows them to participate fully in the conference and we all benefit from the open discussion across disciplines and age groups. As we study connectedness in the past, we are also advancing scholarly communication within our Association. During the past year the Web Site Task Force has created a new web page and a Twitter feed (@socscihist). ### **SSHA Membership**

The Social Science History Association is an interdisciplinary group of scholars that shares interests in social life and theory; historiography, and historical and social-scientific methodologies. SSHA might be best seen as a coalition of distinctive scholarly communities. Our substantive intellectual work ranges from everyday life in the medieval world – and sometimes earlier -- to contemporary global politics, but we are united in our historicized approach to understanding human events, explaining social processes, and developing innovative theory.

The term “social science history” has meant different things to different academic generations. In the 1970s, when the SSHA’s first meetings were held, the founding generation of scholars took it to reflect their concern to address pressing questions by combining social-science method and new forms of historical evidence. Quantitative approaches were especially favored by the association’s historical demographers, as well as some of the economic, social and women’s historians of the time. By the 1980s and 1990s, other waves of scholars – including culturally-oriented historians and anthropologists, geographers, political theorists, and comparative-historical social scientists -- had joined the conversation.

New intellectual directions continue to emerge at the outset of the 21st century. Today’s SSHA incorporates a diversity of scholarly styles, with lots of crosstalk among them.
